

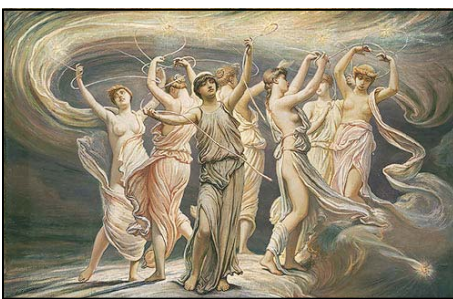
Save the Seven Sisters !



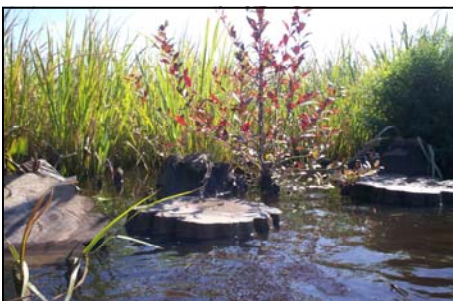
Seven Sisters—standing alone in the old rice fields.

Like sentinels watching over the historic rice fields stand seven of the remaining trees in the wetlands adjacent to the Waccamaw River in Pawleys Island. Coined the “Seven Sisters” by local resident and avid kayaker, Mary Gale Budzisz, these trees remain while many others in the channels and along the river have been timbered. Mary Gale first noticed that trees were being cut in February and became more alarmed over time with the denuding of the area. Her suspicions were raised when she heard what sounded like timbering activity during the dead of night. A subsequent kayak trip revealed cut cypress trees on a neighboring property and even more decimation in the rice fields. Having kayaked in the area over 6 years, Mary Gale has been witness to the destruction of the cypress trees in the area and alarmed about the changes to her beloved rice fields and river. Concern and anger caused her to alert others to this

activity, including the Waccamaw Riverkeeper who subsequently joined Mary Gale on a kayak trip to investigate the situation. What we observed was not only evidence of timbering but also what looked to be disruption of the wetlands along the river; hence, the US Army Corps of Engineers was contacted and provided with information to assist in their investigation. Sadly, to date, we continue to await resolution. In the meantime, the Seven Sisters bear witness to the devastation. Like their mythological counterpart, Pleiades, the seven sisters born to Atlas, a titan who held up the sky, and the oceanid Pleione, the protectress of sailing, these Seven Sisters inspire wonder, the wonder of our natural resources and we wonder, can they be saved?

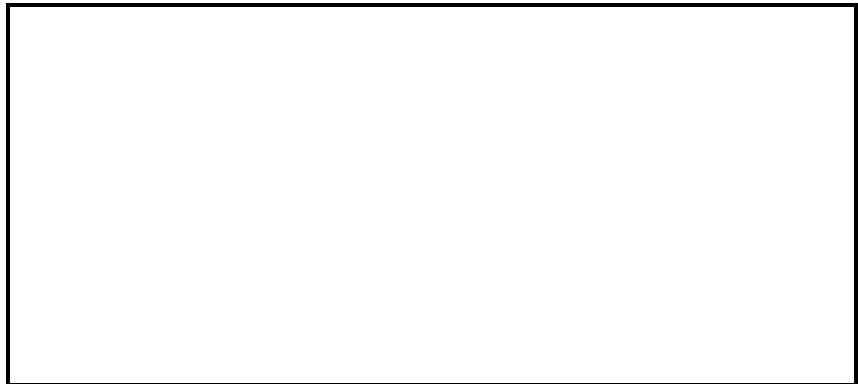
